CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

R. B. Narayanrao Borawake College, Shrirampur is permanently affiliated to S. P. Pune University, Pune and follows the curricula prescribed by the University. The College ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process. The IQAC prepares the academic calendar of the college and also the concerned departments prepare their departmental academic calendars prior to the commencement of every academic year. The academic calendar specifies suitable available dates for significant academic and other activities. The faculty members are briefed on the academic activities of the college on the first meeting of the commencement of every academic year. The Head of the departments arranges departmental meetings to distribute and assign the workload. Considering the workload and planning held in the departmental meetings, the syllabus is disseminated as per classes and papers/courses for teaching. Faculty members prepare a semester-wise teaching plan for theory and practical at the beginning of every term/semester. Each teacher is provided with an academic diary containing timetable, workload, Annual/Semester teaching plan, actual teaching units, daily teaching plan, and academic and administrative committee responsibilities. The academic diary is monitored by the concerned Head of Departments and the Principal of the college. The timetable committee prepares a general time-table and HoD of concerned departments prepare a departmental timetable. Teachers conduct classes according to the timetable. TD-IQAC and departmental meetings are held periodically to review the syllabus completed. For the effective transmission and delivery of curricula, departments integrate classroom teaching with various ICT tools, laboratory practicals, field projects, student seminars, tutorials, question papers solving, research projects, field surveys, on-the-job training, etc. For the up-gradation of subject-related knowledge, the college organizes seminars, conferences, and workshops. This activity provides a platform for the faculty and the students to participate and interact with experts in various fields and enrich and update their subject knowledge. For effective curriculum delivery, teachers use participative, problem solving and student-centric learning methods. Faculties effectively and creatively use PPTs, video lectures, models, charts, various educational software, and the

online NPTEL courses are available to the students for delivering the subject knowledge. The college organizes guest lectures, expert lectures of eminent academicians for the effective curriculum delivery. College also provides special guidance to the slow learners under the Special Guidance Scheme of S. P. Pune University, Pune, remedial coaching, book bank facility etc. Besides this, the college has a mentoring system for academic-related issues. Library provides INFLIBNET, DELNET, e-journals, Database, Shodhganga, OPEC, Book Bank facility, etc. The college also provides departmental library and 50 Mbps internet connectivity with campus Wi-Fi facility to the students and the teachers for effective teaching-learning. Teachers provide study material to the students through their blogs IQAC periodically conducts the Academic and Administrative Audit by the external peer for further improvement in the academic and administrative activities. At the end of every academic year, IQAC collects feedback on curricula from all the stakeholders, it is then analyzed and an analysis report is communicated to the concerned departments and BOS of the university.

<p>Feedback Process: Feedback is a vital part of the teaching and learning process. It helps the mentor to recognize that how the students know his or her subject being taught. This is significant where the teacher can get better his/her teaching methodology that will finally benefit the student. The</p>

collection and analysis of feedback from different stakeholders assist the institution to understand the need of society and what other stakeholders foresee from the institute. With this aim, the college has developed following feedback systems. The feedback are collected from all stakeholders by the IQAC through the feedback committee and analyzed. From the academic year, 2017-18 College has introduced an online feedback system. After analysis of feedback, a inclusive reports are prepared and will be communicated to concern teaching staff/ department head/examination In-charge/ library/BOS of University for their improvement. The report of the same is uploaded on the college website.

Students Feedback: The students are the most important stakeholders of Higher Education systems. The interest and participation of students at all levels in both internal quality assurance and external quality assurance have to play a central role. From the current academic year, the college has started an online feedback system. We have collected online feedback from our undergraduate third-year students and postgraduate students. A special five-point scale feedback form on the curriculum is developed.

Teachers Feedback: The college is affiliated to the Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune, and follows the prescribed curriculum. Still online feedback on curriculum is taken by the respective subject teachers regarding suggestions on improvement of the syllabus.

Parent Feedback: The online feedback from the parents is collected on the current syllabus of the various programs and analyzed.

Alumni Feedback: Our alumni are valuable to us. They provide us the inputs regarding improvement in facilities and employability of our students. We appeal to our alumni to provide there sincere feedback on the curriculum.

The college provides academic, stress-related, and personal counseling and guidance to male and female students, in addition to these issues are regularly monitored by the mentors appointed to students (mentees) under the college Parent Teacher Association (PTA). The mentor interacts and supports the assigned mentees in resolving all their academic, personal, and stress-related problems and issues. The college has separate career guidance and counseling committee. Through this committee, the college organizes programs like pre-marriage counseling, women empowerment, self-defense, etc. Furthermore, the Department of Psychology provides counseling to the girl's students and admission committee members also counsel the students at the time of admission. The prime objective of any educational institute striving to achieve excellence is to identify the respective learning levels of the students. Students from diverse socio-cultural, economical, and educational backgrounds are admitted to the college. Therefore taking into account the varied needs of the students it becomes necessary to identify slow learners and advanced learners at the entry-level. At the commencement of every academic year, the college conducts counseling sessions/induction programs for newly admitted students. In these sessions, the college Principal and the senior faculty members make students aware of their goals and objectives, code of conduct, classroom attendance, examination and evaluation system, and the amenities available in the college. The college has a well-functioning placement cell that organizes activities like Placement drives, lectures on placement opportunities and entrepreneurship development, etc. For the student training and placement, the college has established the Connex Business Solution Limited center on the campus. The college has introduced 34 Short-Term, Skill-Based, and UGC Career Oriented Courses for skill development, creating placement opportunities, entrepreneurship development, etc. The college regularly organizes the various lectures/seminars on academic, stress-related, personal counseling, and competitive and career guidance through various college committees.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college has initiated continuous internal evaluation in accordance with the norms and guidelines of S. P. Pune University, Pune. The College Examination Officer (CEO) is appointed as per the rules and regulations laid down by S.P. Pune University, Pune. Every academic year, The chairman of timetable committee and the CEO prepares the schedule of internal evaluation. The schedule is circulated among the members of the teaching faculty and the same is communicated to the students on the central notice board, besides, concerned teachers make announcements in the classrooms. For the first year courses/ programs, Central Assessment Program (CAP) is undertaken as per the rules and regulations of S.P. Pune University, Pune. The internal examination committee monitors and conducts internal examinations in the college. All the teachers of the concerned departments submit a set of question papers through the Head of the Department to the examination committee. For the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) the college conducts class tests, tutorials, unit tests, departmental seminars, review of research articles, project works, practical examinations, home assignments, open-book tests, etc. The students fill up examination forms through the online portal of the university and the same is submitted to the college. In the view of the guidelines and norms of the S. P. Pune University, Pune for internal assessment, the college has developed department wise objective criteria for calculating internal marks so as to ensure transparency. At the commencement of every academic year, the students are made aware of the continuous internal evaluation mechanism which includes the nature of question papers, marking scheme, various types of evaluation methods, and the marking weightage to be given. All Post Graduate Programmes like M. A. and M.Sc. have Choice Based Credit System as per S. P. Pune

University, Pune. For Post Graduate Programmes 50 weightage is given to internal and 50 weightage is given to the university examination. The internal assessment of the Human Rights, Cyber Security, and other Skill-Based Courses are conducted as per the guidelines of the University for every semester. For the conduct of internal examinations, the college has an Internal Squad to prevent malpractices in the examinations. The answer sheets are shown to the students after evaluation for their information which provides transparency and accountability in the evaluation process. After the results are announced student can seek a revaluation of their answer sheets if needed. Photocopy of the answer sheets is made available to the students on their demand. The answer sheets are preserved and documented for further clarification and use. For the transparency and effectiveness of the continuous internal evaluation process, the college examination committee takes responsibility and monitors the mechanism throughout the year.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The college is permanently affiliated to S. P. Pune University, Pune and has to adhere to the academic calendar published by the University. Before the commencement of every academic year, the IQAC prepares the academic calendar in accordance with the academic calendar of the S.P. Pune University, Pune. Academic Calendar Committee prepares the academic calendar and makes it available to the students and the faculty. The academic calendar specifies the teaching-learning schedule of every academic year and continuous internal evaluation. The examination committee also prepares a tentative schedule of CIE. The Heads of all the departments also prepare their own examination schedule in tune with the academic calendar of the college in consultation with the faculty members. The Principal of the college addresses the newly admitted students to make them aware of various facilities, rules and regulations, and examination related activities. The principal of the college regularly conducts meetings of various college committees to ensure the better functioning of the academic and examination related activities. It is mandatory for the students and the faculty to adhere to the academic calendar for the completion of academic activities. In every academic year, semester wise examination committee meetings are organized for the better conducting of CIE.

P. Pune University, Pune, etc. • To publish quality research articles in UGC listed journals, journals with good reputation/impact factor.

2. The Context: For the development of any country, science and technology play a pivotal role. India is being a developing country, promotion of research is very crucial. In any higher educational institute, knowledge creation is as important as knowledge transfer. This could be achieved, only by enabling the researchers to focus on their core research work with a support system and helping them to gain the necessary funding. The reputation of any educational institution depends on Teaching-Learning-Research and Innovations. Therefore promotion of research is a need of the time. The college initiates research activities through motivation and providing basic research facilities to the faculty and the students.

3. The Practice: • The institution has a Research Advisory Committee and Academic Research Coordinator for promoting research culture in the staff and students. • Faculty members are encouraged to participate and present their research papers in National and International Conferences/Seminars/Workshops/Symposiums for which the college provides financial assistance and also grant duty leave. • Faculty members are motivated to apply for research grants to different funding agencies. • The college provides seed money and incentives to the faculty for research activities. • The college has established Instrumentation Facility Center (IFC) under the DST-FIST scheme. • The college provides computing and internet facility, e-journals, INFLIBNET, DELNET, etc. for research scholars and teachers. • Students are encouraged to participate in AVISHKAR and Science Talent Search Examination. • The college organizes Seminars/Conferences/Workshops on various research themes. • The college provides a Study Leave Facility for the teachers pursuing their Ph. D/M. Phil. degree. • The college provides free access to anti-plagiarism software Turnitin for research scholars and teachers. • The college has established linkages and MoUs with Institutes/Industries for research and training etc.

4. Evidence of Success: After the implementation of the promotion of research as the best practice. The college has observed successful outcomes in research in the last few years. Presently in the college 29 faculty members have been awarded a Ph.D. degree. The college has research centers for Ph.D. and M. Phil. for the subjects Marathi and Economics. 13 faculty members are recognized research guides/supervisors in various subjects and 03 students have completed/submitted a Ph.D. thesis and 02 research scholars have completed their M. Phil. Under their guidance. The college teachers have published 44 research papers in the journals notified by UGC, 02 research papers in conferences /workshops/ symposiums, 09 books/chapters. • The college provides Rs. 5000/- as an incentive for the teachers for their extraordinary work in research. • The college has established a well-equipped Instrumentation Facility Centre (IFC) under the DST-FIST scheme. • Financial supports are provided to the faculty for attending Seminars/Conferences/Workshops etc. • The college has established 36 linkages and 33 MoUs for research, student on-the-job training. • The students participated in the Avishkar Research Competition and Science Talent Search Examination. • The college has established a Soil and Water Testing Laboratory, recognized by Govt. of Maharashtra and generated Rs. 6,91,068/- consultancy through testing soil samples under the Soil Health Card scheme.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: • Laboratory facilities need to be strengthened. • Fewer funds for research projects from UGC, BCUD, S. P. Pune University, Pune etc. • Skilled and trained persons are required in

Instrumentation Facility Centre (IFC) • Less budgetary provision for research activities from the college funds. Best Practice II Green Campus Initiatives:

To enrich the organic farming activity to avoid the use of pesticide-based vegetables. 7. To use renewable energy resources (solar energy). 8. To study and maintain Flora and Fauna on the college campus. 9. To support and implement "Swachh Bharat Abhiyan" for healthy India 10. To organize seminars/workshops, expert lectures, etc. on environment-related issues. 2. The Context: A clean environment is a basic necessity of human beings for health and efficiency. The main aim of the practice is to impart knowledge, create awareness, and develop an attitude of concern and to nurture necessary skills to handle environmental issues and challenges. The semi-urban region and green landscaping of R. B. Narayanrao Borawake College are the necessary features for shaping and sustaining an eco-friendly campus. The college is spread over 42.37 acres of lush green area. The campus is an abode of wildlife species which has provided the context for initiating and imparting the practice for an eco-friendly campus. 3. The Practice: • The college conducts periodically a green audit by external peers. The objective of the green audit is to promote the Environment Management and Conservation on the college campus and introduce and aware students of the real concerns of the environment and its sustainability. We have undertaken a program of labeling the plants on the college campus. Department of Zoology has developed Vermicomposting units on the campus. • The college is using renewable energy like solar energy for water heaters in girls and boys hostels. Solar street lights along the roadside on campus are also installed and used efficiently. Recently the college has installed Solar Power Generation Plant of 53 kWh. • The college has preserved Flora and Fauna on the campus. • The college has installed the Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP) for the treatment of effluent generated from Chemistry laboratories. • In the last five years Rs. 91.86 Lakhs have been incurred on green initiatives and waste management on the campus. For proper disposal of raw glass materials and raw papers (Raddi) institution has made the MoUs with Amol Scientific Glass Works, Babhaleshwar Tal. Rahata and Karimbhai Raddiwala Depot, Shirampur respectively for proper recycling and reuse. • The college organizes seminars/workshops expert lectures etc. on environment-related issues. • College observes 'No Vehicle Day'. • The energy audit of consumption of electricity in the college is conducted periodically by Aditi Engineering Services, Nashik. The objective of the audit is to identify energy consumption and conservation opportunity. • Fire safety audit for fire prevention and electrical safety on the college campus is conducted during the academic year 2018-2019 by Fire Cools, MIDC, and Shirampur. • The college has conducted Carbon Sequestration Audit. The objective of the audit is to measure carbon emission and determination of the carbon footprint analysis. 4. Evidence of the Success: • This best practice has proven to be successful through the following activities: • Through periodical tree plantations, Flora and Fauna on the campus has enriched, which has turned into eco-friendly campus. • Out of total required, electrical power consumption about 70.38 is met through the use of Solar Energy. • Awareness campaign for the plastic-free campus through signboards/display boards made campus plastic-free. • Through the Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP) effluents from the Chemistry laboratory are recycled and treated water is utilized for different purposes. • Vermicomposting units helped us to convert solid waste into organic fertilizers which have minimized the solid waste on the campus. • The college has introduced UGC funded Career Oriented Courses such as Vermicomposting and Rain

Water Harvesting in the last five years. • No Vehicle Day helps us to minimize the air pollution on the campus. • Through workshops/ seminars/expert lectures/ NSS/NCC activities, students are made aware of environmental issues. • Green audit and Energy audit of the campus is done periodically and regularly. • The Lang troth Hive Boxes are placed in the botanical garden for the conservation of honey bees and effective pollination of flowering plants. 5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: While carrying out this practice, the following problems are encountered by the college. • Green Campus initiatives are challenging so it requires determination and long term assurance from all the stakeholders. • Green Campus initiative is a rather expensive practice. It needs expert advice and investment of resources. • Less awareness of students and the community towards environmental issues.
