1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara is a premier educational institution which has invited the attention of international educational fraternity towards its recognition as the biggest educational institution in Asia both in quality and quantity parameters. The Founder of Sanstha, Padmabhushan Dr. Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil had an incisive understanding of the social ills that beset his times and fully realized the dire need of the spread of education. From the very beginning, Sanstha has laid its emphasis on the education for the downtrodden and the poor that really form the major bulk of the society.

Today, Sanstha runs 42 senior colleges, a newly added 1 research institute, 438 secondary schools, 8 training colleges, 42 primary schools, 31 pre-primary schools, 80 cosmopolitan hostels, 7 administrative offices, 8 Ashramshalas, and 57 ancillary branches. It is spread over in 15 districts of Maharashtra and 1 district of Karnataka with 14627 employees belonging to different 170 castes and communities and 4,54,165 students.

- The college is offering 33 academic and research programmes including 14 UG, 15 PG, and 04 research programs
- All 15 PG programmes and 12 UG programs follow the CBCS/elective curriculum.
- The college has introduced 04 new programs in UG, PG and at a research level.
- Introduction of 34 Short Term/Value added/Skill Based/ UGC Career Oriented Courses to meet graduate attributes and learning outcomes.
- Faculty representation as BOS Chairman, BOS Membership and in curriculum development committees and other committees of the University and in various autonomous and other colleges.
- Preparation of academic calendar, departmental meetings, allotment of workload, preparation of time table, teachers diary, daily lesson notes, use of ICT tools, field projects, on-the-job training, use of various academic softwares, feedback mechanism are some of the tools implemented by the college for effective curriculum delivery.
- 28.89% Students have undertaken field projects/internship/on-the-job training in the current academic year.
- IQAC conducts seminars/workshops/symposium, guest lectures, faculty orientation programs etc. for curriculum enrichment and enhancement.
- Effective integration of cross-cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment, Human Values, and Professional Ethics into the curriculum. Apart from University curriculum, college organizes various activities/programs such as '**No Vehicle Day**', plastic-free campus, gender sensitivity programs, premarriage counseling etc. through NSS and NCC units.
- The structural online feedback is collected from all the stakeholders on the curriculum it is then analyzed and discussed in the departmental meeting and communicated to BOS of the university for the improvement and further necessary action.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- College is rural oriented one and students come from the neighboring villages. The college has very few out of state students.
- After admission, the college assesses the learning levels of the students through a diagnostic test and identifies advanced and slow learners. Advanced learners are provided with INFLIBNET membership,

NPTEL online courses, e-resources, research journals and are encouraged to participate in Avishkar research competition, MADHAVA Mathematics competition, Chemiad examinations etc. Special guidance scheme of S. P. Pune University, Pune and remedial coaching offers special attention to slow learners.

- Necessary facilities are available for differently abled students (Divyangjan).
- Well functioning Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and counseling cell.
- Various student-centric learning methods and tools such as field projects, on-the-job training, survey method, role-playing various academic software, ICT enabled classrooms etc. for enhancing teaching-learning processes.
- College sets the learning outcomes for all programmes and communicated to the teachers and students and uploaded on the college website. Learning outcomes are assessed periodically.
- Encouragement to the teachers to acquire higher qualifications. As an outcome of this the number of teachers with Ph. D during the last five years has significantly increased from 12 to 29.
- The college strictly adheres to the academic calendar for conducting the Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) by conducting regular class tests, seminars, open book tests, surprise tests, book reviews, home assignments etc.
- Learning outcomes are reflected in a high pass percentage of the students, their success in NET/SET/GATE examination and university merit ranking.
- The college has a transparent, time-bound and efficient mechanism to deal with examination related grievances.
- IQAC reviews the academic performance of each department.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- 63 research projects funded by various funding agencies including self-funded minor research projects have been completed/ ongoing.
- 12 teachers are recognized as research guides by the S. P. Pune University, Pune and 21 scholars have completed Ph.D. under their guidance. The faculty have published 136 research papers in UGC notified journals, 213 research papers in conferences/seminars/workshops proceedings and 58 books/chapters in various reputed publications.
- The college has conducted 16 workshops/seminars on Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and Industry-Academia Innovations.
- 29 faculty members have been awarded Ph. D. degree. The college has research centers for Ph. D. and M. Phil. in the subjects Marathi and Economics.
- The college has anti-plagiarism Committee and the code of ethics for research. College provides free access to Turnitin/Urkund anti-plagiarism software.
- The college has received RS. 99, 00,000/- under DST-FIST Scheme.
- The college has provided Rs. 5,46,000/- as seed money for the Minor Research Projects to the faculty.
- Incentives of Rs. 5000/- is given to the teacher who receives State, National and International recognition/ awards.
- The college has NSS and NCC units through which we undertake extension activities in the neighborhood community and help in the holistic development of students and the vicinity.
- The college has conducted extension and outreach programs in the collaboration with various stakeholders of the society. Participation in *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*, AIDS Awareness, Blood Donation Camps, Gender Issues etc.

- Functional 41 MoUs and 93 linkages for field trips, on-the-job training, placements, resource exchanges etc.
- The College is working in collaboration with the Invention, Innovation and Incubation center established by Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college has excellent infrastructure and learning resources including ICT enabled classrooms, seminar halls, fully equipped laboratories, computer laboratories, and other support facilities.
- It also has the substantial infrastructure required for sports activities like athletics, basketball, volleyball, badminton, yoga, table tennis, weightlifting, powerlifting, wrestling etc.
- The Library is partially automated with Integrated Library Management System (Libreria Software), which houses a sufficient number of books in all disciplines, the collection of rare books, e-journals etc.
- The learning resources like Language laboratory, DELNET, INFLIBNET, e-journals, e-books, Shodhganga, Database, Rayat Knowledge Bank etc. are available in the library.
- The Budget for infrastructure, library and other learning resources is earmarked annually based on the recommendations of respective committees constituted for upgrading, maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities.
- The Department of Computer Science monitors the overall functioning of ICT resources.
- There are a sufficient number of UPS's for ensuring power backup.
- The college maintains an adequate student computer ratio (7:1) with 50 Mbps bandwidth internet connection and campus Wi-Fi facility.
- The college has well-equipped Instrumentation Facility Center (IFC).
- The college has established Annual Maintenance Contracts (AMC) with different vendors/ firms for maintaining physical, academic and support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

- The college is having the well-established student support system for financial/scholarship assistance, capability enhancement /development, student progression, and alumni engagement.
- More than 75% of the students have benefitted by the scholarships and Freeships provided by the Government and Non-Government agencies.
- The college has provided Rs. 26,67,842/- for the needy and economically weaker students under the Student Aid Fund.
- Earn and Learn Scheme is functional in the college. In the last five years, the college has spent Rs. 26,17,140/- under this scheme.
- The college has a healthy system to provide support to students for skill development, career counseling, competitive examination guidance, placement, and entrepreneurship development.
- Functional Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and counseling cell to mentor the students regarding academic, career, financial and stress-related issues.
- The Placement Cell maintains a strong relationship with industry and supports students in placements. Placement cell and skill development programs strengthen student's capabilities and to encourage them to start their own ventures through national Start-up schemes.

- The college has established **Conneqt Business Solution** center on the campus for students placement and training.
- Reading room facility, INFLIBNET, e-journals, NET/SET guidance is available for the students who show interest in acquiring higher education and appearing for competitive examinations. In the last five years, 61 students have qualified NET/SET/GATE and other competitive examinations.
- Students having representation on various college committees like CDC, IQAC, Library Committee, Gymkhana Committee etc.
- The students have received awards/medals in State/National/International level tournaments in various sports events.
- The students Council is constituted as per the rules and regulations laid down by S.P. Pune University, Pune.
- The college has registered Alumni Association which has contributed Rs.6,52,800/- for college development.

Governance, Leadership and Management

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

R. B. Narayanrao Borawake College, Shrirampur is permanently affiliated to S. P. Pune University, Pune and follows the curricula prescribed by the University.

The College ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process. The IQAC prepares the academic calendar of the college and also the concerned departments prepare their departmental academic calendars prior to the commencement of every academic year. The academic calendar specifies suitable dates for significant academic and other activities.

The faculty members are briefed on the academic activities of the college on the first meeting of the commencement of every academic year. The Head of the departments arranges departmental meetings to distribute and assign the workload. Considering the workload and planning held in the departmental meetings, the syllabus is disseminated as per classes and papers/courses for teaching.

Faculty members prepare semester-wise teaching plan for theory and practical at the beginning of every term/semester.

Each teacher is provided with an academic diary containing timetable, workload, Annual/Semester teaching plan, actual teaching units, daily teaching plan, and academic and administrative committee responsibilities. The academic diary is monitored by the concerned Head of Departments and the Principal of the college.

The timetable committee prepares a general time-table and HoD of concerned departments prepare departmental timetable. Teachers conduct classes according to the timetable. TD-IQAC and departmental meetings are held periodically to review the syllabus completed.

For the effective transmission and delivery of curricula, departments integrate classroom teaching with various ICT tools, laboratory practicals, field projects, students seminars, tutorials, question papers solving, research projects, field survey, on-the-job training etc.

For the upgradation of subject-related knowledge, college organizes seminars, conferences, and workshops. This activity provides a platform to the faculty and the students to participate and interact with experts in various fields and enrich and update their subject knowledge.

For the effective curriculum delivery teachers use participative, problem solving and student-centric learning methods.

Faculties effectively and creatively use PPTs, video lectures, models, charts, various educational softwares,

and the online NPTEL courses are available to the students for delivering the subject knowledge. The college organizes guest lectures, expert lectures of eminent academicians for the effective curriculum delivery.

College also provides special guidance to the slow learners under the Special Guidance Scheme of S. P. Pune University, Pune, remedial coaching, book bank facility etc. Besides this, the college has a mentoring system for academic-related issues.

Library provides INFLIBNET, DELNET, e-journals, Database, Shodhganga, OPEC, Book Bank facility etc. The college also provides departmental library and 50 Mbps internet connectivity with campus Wi-Fi facility to the students and the teachers for effective teaching-learning.

Teachers provide study material to the students through their blogs

IQAC periodically conducts the Academic and Administrative Audit by the external peer for further improvement in the academic and administrative activities.

At the end of every academic year, IQAC collects feedback on curricula from all the stakeholders, it is then analyzed and analysis report is communicated to the concerned departments and BOS of the university.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The prime objective of any educational institute striving to achieve excellence is to identify respective learning levels of the students. 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The academic plan of R. B. Narayanrao Borawake College, Shrirampur is student-centric. Various methods of experiential and participatory learning, as well as problem-solving methodologies, are implemented to make sure that students are dynamic participants than passive listeners in the teaching-learning process.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

- The college has initiated continuous internal evaluation in accordance with the norms and guidelines of S. P. Pune University, Pune.
- The College Examination Officer (CEO) is appointed as per the rules and regulations laid down by S.P. Pune University, Pune.
- Every academic year, The chairman of timetable committee and the CEO prepares the schedule of internal evaluation. The schedule is circulated among the members of teaching faculty and the same is communicated to the students on the central notice board, besides, concerned teachers make announcements in the classrooms.
- For the first year courses/ programs, Central Assessment Program (CAP) is undertaken as per the

rules and regulations of S.P. Pune University, Pune.

- The internal examination committee monitors and conducts internal examinations in the college. All the teachers of the concerned departments submit a set of question papers through the Head of the Department to the examination committee.
- For the Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) the college conducts class tests, tutorials, unit tests, departmental seminars, review of research articles, project works, practical examinations, home assignments, open book tests etc.
- The students fill up examination forms through the online portal of the university and the same is submitted to the college.
- In the view of the guidelines and norms of the S. P. Pune University, Pune for internal assessment, the college has developed department wise objective criteria for calculating internal marks so as to ensure transparency.
- At the commencement of every academic year, the students are made aware of the continuous internal evaluation mechanism which includes nature of question papers, marking scheme, various types of evaluation methods and the marking weightage to be given.
- All Post Graduate Programmes like M. A. and M.Sc. have Choice Based Credit System as per S. P. Pune University, Pune.
- For Post Graduate Programmes 50% weightage is given to internal and 50% weightage is given to the university examination.
- The internal assessment of the Human Rights, Cyber Security, and other Skill-Based Courses are conducted as per the guidelines of the University for every semester.
- For the conduct of internal examinations, the college has Internal Squad to prevent malpractices in the examinations.
- The answer sheets are shown to the students after evaluation for their information which provides transparency and accountability in the evaluation process.
- After the results are announced student can seek a revaluation of their answer sheets if needed.
- Photocopy of the answer sheets is made available to the students on their demand.
- The answer sheets are preserved and documented for further clarification and use.
- For the transparency and effectiveness of the continuous internal evaluation process, the college examination committee takes the responsibility and monitors the mechanism throughout the year.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

- The college has initiated continuous and comprehensive internal evaluation in accordance with the norms and guidelines of S. P. Pune University, Pune.
- The examination committee prepares the examination schedule and it is communicated to the students on the central notice board, besides, concerned teachers make announcements in the classrooms.

- The benchmark of the evaluation includes attendance, tutorials, practicals, field projects, research projects, assignments/seminars/oral presentations and the score secured in the internal tests.
- All the PG programs have a Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and internal evaluation is undertaken as per the University rules.
- All the teachers of concerned subjects submit a set of question papers through the Head of the Department to the examination committee. The question papers for the internal examination are prepared in a uniform pattern and as per the guidelines of the University.
- The exam is conducted on a common schedule and supervised by the junior supervisor.
- The syllabus for the internal examination is communicated to the students in advance by the concerned subject teacher.
- The answer sheets are shown to students after evaluation for their information which provides transparency and accountability in the evaluation process students grievances are taken care of and are redressed in a timely manner.
- Online internal marks are submitted to the university through teacher's login accounts on the university internal examination portal.
- The college has appointed internal squad for the prevention of malpractices in the internal examination.
- Mobile phone in the examination hall is strictly prohibited.
- Marks lists of the students are prepared after the evaluation and documented for the further clarification.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

The students are the important stakeholders in any institution imparting education, and it is our endeavor to make all efforts to ensure transparency in all the activities at different stages. Taking this spirit into consideration the college deals with examination related grievances transparently, efficiently and in a timely manner.

- The examination related grievances of the students are addressed at the college level and University level depending upon the necessity of the grievances.
- Grievances associated with the internal assessment are handled by the examination section of the college whereas grievances related to the external assessment are forwarded to the S. P. Pune University, Pune.
- College follows the guidelines laid down by S. P. Pune University, Pune for redressal of grievances.
- The code of the conduct of examination is available in the college prospectus and on the website. The same is displayed on the notice board for the students.

- The college has an Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) constituted under the chairmanship of the Principal to look into the matter and appropriate measures are taken sensibly, transparently and within the stipulated time limit.
- The schedule of the examination is prepared by the Examination Committee for the notification of the students and communicated to the students in advance.
- The grievances regarding internal practical examinations are resolved immediately by the concerned teachers and HoDs of the various departments.
- Central Assessment Programme (CAP) is undertaken as per the rules and regulations of the University.
- Internal Examination answer sheets are shown to the students after the assessment by the concerned subject teachers for further clarification of the students.
- Research related grievances are resolved by the concerned Research Department Coordinators and the Head of the institute.
- Internal examination marks of various subjects are filled and submitted through Online Portal of the University by the Login Id of the concerned subject teachers.
- The college examination committee addresses the grievances regarding the evaluation of first-year annual examinations. It is similar to the system for revaluation adopted by the University.
- Grievances of the students such as online examination form, incorrect entry of marks, queries related to subject codes/programs, wrong entries in names, hall tickets, absenteeism etc. are addressed in stipulated time by the college and the university.
- A time-bound redressal mechanism is suggested by S. P. Pune University, Pune. As per the guidelines and rules set by the University. There is a provision for revaluation of the answer sheets. The students can get the photocopies of their answer sheets by depositing the required fees to evaluate the answer sheets on their own and find out the actual position. If the students are not satisfied with the marks which are given by the examiner they can also apply for rechecking and revaluation or moderation.
- The college appoints the Internal Squad to prevent malpractices in the examination hall at the time of examinations.

Direct method:

- The set program outcomes, course outcomes, and program specific outcomes are collected for different courses
- The target levels are set
- Calculations are done for the attainment of the course outcomes to program outcomes.
- Each CO is mapped to PO to make a (CO-PO) matrix.

The Attainment of course outcome is calculated by using the following formula;

• Attainment of Course at UG level:

Attainment of Course = 80% (Attainment level in university examination) + 20% (Attainment level in internal examination)

• Attainment of Course at PG level:

Attainment of Course = 50% (Attainment level in university examination) + 50% (Attainment level in internal examination)

Using students internal evaluation marks and University examinations, marks the attainment of CO's are evaluated.

Assessment-CO's matrix is prepared for each course.

The attainment level for course outcome is defined as follows:

Level 1: 40% of students scored more than university average.

Level 2:50% of students scored more than university average.

Level 3: 60% students scored more than university average.

For the calculation of PO's the average attainment values of all courses are considered.

The attainment of program outcome is calculated by using the following formula;

Attainment of program outcome at UG level= 80% (Average attainment by the university examination) + 20% (Average attainment by internal examination)

Attainment of program outcome at PG level = 50% (Average attainment by the university examination) + 50% (Average attainment by internal examination)

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations including incubation centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

The college has created an ecosystem for innovation including incubation center and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge. The college takes pride in mentioning some of the activities that create an ecosystem for innovation, creation, and transfer of knowledge such as:

1. Innovation and Incubation Centre:

The college is working under the parent institute, Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara which has established Invention, Innovation, and Incubation Center in support with TATA Technology under CSR fund of 20 Cr. The college is working in collaboration with this center. Our student's models, Auto melting point and use of Calcium Carbide as a sensor for artificial ripening of fruits have been selected and awarded by this center.

The college has organized workshops/seminars and lead lectures such as Start-up-India, Soft Skills Development, Entrepreneurship Development Program etc.

2. Rayat Vidnyan Parishad:

The college has successfully organized Rayat Vidnyan Parishad (Rayat Science Conference) in collaboration with TIFR, Mumbai, in 2014, to promote the research attitude in the school children, teachers, and the college students. In this Parishad students and teachers have presented their scientific models, toys and research papers.

3. Research Advisory Committee and Academic Research Coordinator

The college has a Research Advisory Committee and Academic Research Coordinator (ARC). The main objectives of the committee and ARC are to inculcate research culture and attitude amongst the students and the teachers.

Following are outcomes of Research Advisory Committee and ARC

- Presently 29 faculty members have been awarded Ph. D. degree. The college has research centers for Ph. D. and M. Phil. 12 faculty members are recognized as research guides and 21 students have completed Ph.D. under their guidance. The teachers have published 136 research papers in the UGC notified journals, 213 research papers in seminars/conferences and 58 books/chapters in various reputed publications.
- The college has organized 30 Seminars/Conferences/ Workshops in the last five years.
- The college has established 93 linkages and 41 MoU's for research, on-the-job training, field projects etc.
- The students have participated and awarded in Avishkar, Rayat Inspire research competitions, and Science Talent Search Examination.
- The college has established a Soil and Water Testing Laboratory.

4. Intellectual Property Right Cell (IPR):

This cell monitors and addresses issues related to research and IPR. Following mentioned few activities/workshops were conducted under the IPR cell such as:

- Seminar on IPR: An Introduction and Information.
- Seminar on IPR and Economic Growth in India.
- Workshop on the Role of IPR in Technology Transfer and Economic Growth: Prospectus and Challenges.
- IPR: New Age Challenges

5. Career Counseling and Placement Cell:

The college has a well-functioning placement cell which organizes activities like Placement drives, lectures on placement opportunities and entrepreneurship development etc. For the student training and placement, the college has established Conneqt Business Solution Limited center on the campus.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities in the neighbourhood community in terms of impact and sensitising students to social issues and holistic development during the last five years

Response:

The college organizes a number of extension activities to promote institute-neighborhood community association to sensitize the students towards community needs to bring communal transformation in the surrounding rural communities.

Impact of extension activities in the neighborhood communities:

The students actively participate in social service activities leading to their overall development. The college runs effectively National Service Scheme (NSS) and National Cadet Corps (NCC). Through these schemes, the institution undertakes various extension activities in the neighborhood communities. At present, the strength of the NSS unit is of 250 volunteers. Every year the college selects a village in the vicinity, organizes a camp for seven days and takes up cleanliness, village survey, and other constructive works. During the last five years, the NSS volunteer have organized camps in Brahmangaon-Vetal and Nipani-Vadgaon. Several noteworthy activities were carried out by NSS volunteers, which include tree plantation, water conservation through digging of contour trenches, digging of pits for construction of toilets in the village, making paths and roads. The impact is, the villages have got new green coverage, increased groundwater level, clean roads, and surroundings and importantly villagers learned the significance of the rainwater harvesting and importance of water conservation. The camps and awareness programs have improved their understanding of various social issues.

The NCC unit has undertaken various activities like Flag Day fund Collection, Yoga training, NCC camps etc. for developing character and discipline amongst the students.

As a social commitment Soil and Water Testing Laboratory tested 2598 soil samples received from the farmers under the Soil Health Card Scheme, initiated by Govt. of India.

Impact of extension activities in sensitizing students to social issues and holistic development:

The college is conscious of its responsibilities for shaping students into responsible citizens of the country by making them aware of social issues. The college provides consciousness to the students as well villagers about the significance of social issues like eradication of superstitions, conservation of water, *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*, environmental pollution, personal health and hygiene, road safety, AIDS awareness rallies etc. The college has also organized several social activities like *Gram Swachhata Abhiyan*, Tree Plantation, Soil and Water Testing, Farmer's Sumeet, 'Jagar Janivancha', *Nirbhaya Kanya Abhiyan*, Pre-Marriage Counseling, Blood Donation Camps and Blood Group Check-Up and Health Check-Up Camps.

The college also has organized awareness programmes on human rights, cybercrime, and cybersecurity, voter awareness programme, about GST and demonetization. Lectures were organized for the students and villagers about the importance of wearing a helmet, prevention of drug addiction etc. These activities helped the students to understand real-life problems, the dignity of labor, and helped them in developing team spirit and self-confidence. We also sensitized the students to the various social issues and social responsibilities, which in turn helped them in their holistic development as responsible citizens with moral

values. The college runs short term courses like Vermicomposting, Rain Water Harvesting, Soil, and Water Testing, Dairy Science and other Career Oriented Courses to create environmental awareness amongst the students.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The institution has adequate facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Response:

The college has augmented its infrastructure systematically and continuously over the years. The college has state of the art infrastructural facilities like adequate classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, staff rooms, restrooms, conference halls, seminar hall, reading room, ramps for the physically challenged students. The college has excellent classrooms to conduct regular classes in the five different building blocks, like Block-A, Block-C, Block-F, Block-H, and Block-I. To ensure its optimal utilization, besides conducting regular classes, the classrooms are used for conducting remedial coaching, certificate courses, annual and semester examinations; departmental meetings, prayer meetings, mentoring sessions, association activities, indoor competitions, Parent-Teacher meet, alumni meet, book exhibitions, training programme for the school children and competitive examination center.

Library:

Spacious and well-ventilated library with a collection of 1,06,577 reference books and textbooks, 3135000 e-books, 6000 e-journals, 95 periodicals, 02 digital database and 478 CD's/Videos. The central library and reading hall have a good capacity where 200+ users can seat and study comfortably. The library provides DELNET, INFLIBNET, Rayat Knowledge Bank, Shodhganga, **Turnitin/Urkund** anti-plagiarism software and computers with internet facility for students and teachers.

Laboratories:

All the Laboratories of the college are fully equipped with advanced equipments. Each department has its own computing facility with the latest software to meet their own requirements for carrying out academic and research works. In addition to the regular curriculum, students are encouraged to pursue their study/project work in the emerging areas of research.

Instrumentation Facility Centre:

To strengthen and inculcate research culture amongst the students and teachers, the college has 46 advanced and sophisticated instruments in the DST-FIST sponsored Instrumentation Facility Center (IFC).

Language Laboratory:

For enriching the communicative abilities of the students the college has made available Advanced Digital Language Laboratory with interactive language lab software from ETNL, Kochi, Kerala.

Computing Equipments:

The college has 418 computers in all the departments for day-to-day use for the students and the faculty. Computers are also provided in staff rooms and departmental library.

The college has provided LCD projectors, smart boards, printers with scanning and Xerox facility to each department for effective ICT enabled teaching learning. All the departments and computer labs are connected with 50 Mbps bandwidth.

Computer labs, language lab, networking center, various software, and tools are available for facilitating the teaching and learning process.

Gymnasium houses modern equipments like Double Bar, Chin up Bar, Weighing Machine, Elliptical Cycle, Power Lifting, and Weight Lifting Sets, Recumbent Bike Cycle, Multipurpose Bench, Single Station Exercise Machine, Gym Mirrors and Weight Plates etc. in its Fitness Zone. UGC sponsored indoor sports facility hall with the furnished wooden court has been newly constructed. The Zone is open to both students and staff from 6 am to 6 pm. Students are given training in all sports games to take part in collegiate, inter-collegiate, inter-zonal, inter-university all India inter-University, State, National, and International level competitions. The college physical directors regularly train the students in various

games such as Badminton, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Volleyball, Table Tennis, Judo, Wrestling, Fencing, Basket Ball etc.

To motivate sports players, the college provides incentives like traveling allowance, dearness allowance, sports kits and tracksuits to the winners and participants. The provision of traveling funds under seed money for international players is made available. The college also gives concession in tuition fee and hostel fee to the sports students.

- Upgradation of software and hardware and maintenance of ICT facilities is done by the Department of Computer Science through Vitrag Computer Pvt. Ltd. Sangli and Shri Computers, Shrirampur.
- Each departmental laboratory is having lab assistant and lab attendants for the proper maintenance of the laboratories.
- The college is having hostel committee which manages the hostel maintenance and proper utilization of the hostel facilities.
- The college successfully runs **Earn and Learn Scheme**. The students working under this scheme help in maintaining and cleaning the college campus, garden, library etc.
- Separate non-teaching staff is appointed for housekeeping.
- Shrirampur Municipal Corporation also helps in maintaining in housekeeping and cleanliness on the campus.

6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

Response:

6.2.2 Organizational structure of the institution including governing body, administrative setup, and functions of various bodies, service rules, procedures, recruitment, promotional policies as well as grievance redressal mechanism

Response:

The college is permanently affiliated to S. P. Pune University, Pune and is governed by Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara. The college is having three-tier systems for its governance. At Sanstha, level college is governed by the President, the Chairman, and the Secretary. At the college level, the Principal is the apex of the internal administration and is assisted by the Vice-principals, Registrar, HoDs, staff, and IQAC. The apex body of the college is 'College Development Committee'(CDC).

Administrative Setup:

- The administrative setup consists of the Principal followed by the Vice-principals, faculty incharges, Registrar, Head clerk, Junior Clerks, Assistants, and Attendants.
- The organization of departments includes Head of Departments, Associate Professors, Assistant

- The formal organizational structure of the library staff includes the Librarian, Library Clerk, and Library Assistant.
- Organization structure of the Department of Physical Education and Sports includes a Director of Physical Education and the Attendant.

Service Rules:

• For the service conditions and rules, the college follows the rules and regulation laid down by S. P. Pune University, Pune, UGC, New Delhi and Government of Maharashtra.

Procedures for Recruitment:

In the college the recruitment is carried out in two different ways:

- Permanent Posts (Grant-in-aid): These posts are recruited by the Government of Maharashtra according to the norms of the University and UGC.
- Temporary Posts (Non-Grant): These posts are recruited by the Sanstha Management according to the norms of the University and UGC.

Procedures for Promotion:

The promotion is allotted according to S. P. Pune University, Pune, UGC, New Delhi and Government of Maharashtra.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism:

The college has a Sexual Harassment Committee, Anti-ragging Committee, Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) and Disciplinary Committee for timely redressal of the student and the faculty grievances.

Performance Appraisal System for teaching-staff:

The college has a Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) for the teaching staff following UGC regulations, 2010 and four amendments thereafter. 6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

In the pursuance for quality assurance, quality up-gradation, assessment and accreditation, and institutionalization the college has established the Internal Quality Assurance Cell on 23rd Oct. 2003. Since then IQAC has become instrumental in suggesting a number of quality improvement measures in the college. IQAC in the college is constituted at two levels:

- At the College level
- Departmental level (TD-IQAC)

The two examples of practices institutionalized as a result of IQAC initiatives are given as under:

• Augmentation of teaching-learning facilities.

To cope up with the changing world scenario IQAC has tried to keep pace with the ICT enabled teachinglearning process as a result of this over the years IQAC set up 46 ICT enabled smart classrooms, 418 computers, and 46 printers to facilitate the teaching-learning process. E-journals, DELNET, INFLIBNET, SWAYAM-NPTEL local chapter for online courses, Shodhganga membership, e-books database, 50 Mbps internet connection with campus Wi-Fi facility are available for the students and staff. Most of the teachers of the college are having their blogs; these blogs are used for circulating study materials. College is having its own YouTube Channel to provide audio-video lectures of the faculty. The e-content of Rayat Knowledge Bank is also made available.

• Strengthen Research Culture in the College.

IQAC plays an important role in inculcating research culture in the college. Due to the efforts taken by IQAC at present, 29 faculty members have been awarded Ph. D degree. The college has research centers for Ph. D. and M. Phil. 12 faculty members are recognized research supervisors in various subjects and 21 research scholars have completed Ph.D. under their guidance. The college teachers have published research papers in the journals notified by UGC, 213 published 136 papers in conferences/workshops/symposiums, 58 books/chapters in various publications and 01 Major and 62 Minor Research Projects completed/ongoing during the last five years.

Organization and Participation of students in the Avishkar, Rayat Inspire Camps, Rayat Avishkar Research Competition, Rayat Vidnyan Parishad, Chemiad, Science Talent Search Examination.

• The college provides seed money for research projects and research incentives to teachers.

- The college has developed a well-equipped instrumentation facility center under DST-FIST for teaching and research.
- The college has organized 30 Seminars/Conferences/ Workshops in the last five years.
- Financial support is provided to the faculty for presenting their research work in Seminars /Conferences/Workshops etc.
- The college has successfully organized Rayat Vidnyan Parishad in collaboration with Tata Institutes of Fundamental Research, Mumbai (TIFR) in 2014.
- The college has established functional 93 linkages and 41 MoUs for research, student training, and job on the training, resources sharing etc.

- The college has introduced 04 new programmes in the last five years.

Response:

The college reviews its teaching-learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC.

Following are two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching-learning reforms facilitated by IQAC

• Structured feedback and Review of learning outcomes:

Feedback is a vital part of the teaching-learning process. The analysis of the effectiveness of teachinglearning is made through the stakeholder's feedback mechanism. It helps the mentor to recognize that how the students know his or her subject being taught. The collection and analysis of feedback from different stakeholder assist the institution to understand the need of society and what other stakeholders foresee from the college. Keeping this view in the center, IQAC has developed well-structured feedback systems. IQAC prepares various feedback forms and collects structured feedback on design and review of syllabus and student feedback on teachers. Each department analyzes the feedback, discusses in the departmental meetings and submits a consolidated report to IQAC. IQAC prepares an inclusive feedback report of the college and communicates to concern BOS of S. P. Pune University, Pune for further improvement and implementation.

From the academic year, 2017-18 the college has developed an online feedback system.

Student learning outcomes are reviewed through class tests, assignments, class seminars, field projects, review of research papers/books, open book tests, internal assessment tests, and university examinations. University result analysis is made for each semester at the department level and is discussed in IQAC/CDC, TD-IQAC meetings for further improvement and implementation. This helps in identifying the slow and advance learners.

• Teacher's Diary:

Effective teaching achieves its success only if it is well planned. And, hence for the proper planning of teaching each teacher is provided with an academic diary containing timetable, annual/semester wise teaching planning, workload, actual teaching units, syllabus completing summary, daily teaching plan and academic and administrative committee responsibilities. Every teacher has to maintain an individual Teacher Diary to record the day to day teaching-learning activities regularly. The teaching Diary gives an overall summary of the topics covered by a teacher in each class per course, per semester. The Individual Teacher Diary verified and signed by HoD of the concerned departments and is then submitted to the Principal for final approval. The Principal monitors the overall teaching performance of the teachers through the verification of the Diary.

Besides this IQAC has reviewed and implemented its teaching-learning process through the following ways:

- Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for all PG programmes
- IQAC has organized NAAC sponsored National seminar
- Use of ICT in teaching and learning encouraged
- DELNET, INFLIBNET, NPTEL online courses, database, and 50 Mbps internet connection and campus Wi-Fi facility.
- UGC-COC/Skill Based/Value-added courses for students
- The college employed various student-centric learning methods such as class seminar, field visit, onthe-job-training, survey, role playing etc.
- Collection of Self Appraisal Form (API) from faculty

Response:

The College is very keen on the desires, aspirations, abilities and professional skills of human resources as men and women, without any discrimination about their gender. Further extensive efforts are taken into account for the communal and artistic factors involved in gender-based exclusion and prejudice in the most diverse spheres of community and personal life.

The college shows gender sensitivity in providing facilities such as:

- Safety and Security
- Counseling
- Common Room Facility
- **Safety and Security**: A Security personnel is appointed on the campus round the clock. For the girl's hostels, the full-time warden is appointed.

- **CCTV Monitoring**: CCTV cameras are installed on the college premises which provide 24 hrs .surveillance in order to observe the ongoing activities.
- **Complain Box**: The campus is set with a complain box which is positioned near the Principal's old cabin intended to collect any suggestions or any complaint from female staff and girl students of the campus concerning any abuse or harassment.
- Grievance Redressal Committees: The college has committees to monitor and address safety, security and social issues like Anti-ragging Committee, Sexual Harassment Committee, Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) and Grievance Redressal Committee.
- **Health Aid Facilities**: The college has appointed a lady doctor for dealing with the health issues of girl's students. Every year the college conducts health and hemoglobin check-up camp.
- Fire Safety Equipments: The college conducts the fire audit and fire extinguishers are installed in hostels and other places in the college.
- Wall Compound: Wall compound covering the whole campus with barbed wire fencing is available for campus security.
- College Campus Supervision Committee: The college has a campus supervision committee for campus supervision during the working hours.
- Awareness Programs and Lectures/Special Talks: The college organizes seminars/special talks on a regular basis in order to endorse social values such as gender equality, gender sensitivity and highlights social problems such as women safety, dowry, women's health, and cybercrime and cybersecurity.

Every year Board of Student Development organizes various programmes for boosting the confidence of female faculty and students through initiatives such as Nirbhaya Kanya Abhiyan, Personality Development Camp, Stress Management, Yoga and Meditation Training Programme, International Women's Day etc.

• Counseling:

The college provides academic, stress-related and personal counseling and guidance to male and female students, in addition to these issues are regularly monitored by the mentors appointed to students (mentees) under the college Parent Teacher Association (PTA). The mentor interacts and supports the assigned mentees in resolving all their academic, personal and stress-related problems and issues. The college has separate career guidance and counseling committee. Through this committee, the college organizes programs like pre-marriage counseling, women empowerment, self-defense etc. Furthermore, the Department of Psychology provides counseling to the girls students and admission committee members also counsel the students at the time of admission.

The college provides separate common rooms and washrooms for girls and boys. Girls' common rooms are equipped with facilities like **First Aid Box** and **Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine** and other necessary things.

The college's key activities have very less impact on the environment as the college is very responsive of generating less waste and recycling it by passing it through the scientific ways that enable the used material to be recycled ensuring that less natural resources are used. Waste generated on the campus is segregated as a solid waste, liquid waste, and e-waste.

Solid Waste Management:

For the collection of regular solid waste (Dry and Wet) garbage bins are kept at different places on the campus and in laboratories. The collected solid waste is picked up by Municipal Corporation, Shrirampur time to time for proper disposal and recycling. Waste from plants is also collected and used in Vermicomposting units for preparation of organic compost. For proper disposable of raw glass material and raw papers (Raddi) college has signed the MoUs with Amol Scientific Glass Works, Babhaleshwar Tal-Rahata and Karimbhai Raddiwala Depot, Shrirampur respectively for proper recycling and reuse.

Liquid Waste Management:

The college has installed the Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP) for treating the liquid waste which is generated in the Chemistry laboratories. This plant has purification capacity of 3000 lit./day. The recycled water is used for various purposes on the campus.

E-waste Management:

E-waste corner has been set up in the computer department laboratory where the college e-waste is collected from time to time. The collected e-waste is sold to the proper agency for recycling, for this purpose the parent institution has signed MoUs with M/S. Mahalaxmi e-recyclers Pvt. Ltd., Kolhapur.

7.1.6 Rain water harvesting structures and utilization in the campus

Response:

The college is situated in a drought-prone declared area hence to overcome water scarcity and to ensure a permanent supply certain measures are predominantly taken. The college campus has a scientifically well-equipped rainwater harvesting unit facilitated by an ideal set up. Rooftop water from H and I building blocks are collected and taken into bore-well recharge pits. Check dam and bore-well are recharged by rainwater. Department of Chemistry collects around 40,000 liters of rooftop rainwater from Chemistry

laboratories every year and it is used as distilled water for experiments/practicals in science laboratories. This is the most cost-effective way of rainwater harvesting. Since there is no energy expenditure on transportation and distribution of water, energy is also conserved. Dr. Cholke S. P., Associate Professor, Department of Geography has recently published scholarly views on Rainwater harvesting potentials of R. B. N. B College Campus, Shrirampur in a reputed International Journal of Science and Research.

Students and staff members are encouraged to use bicycles for the commuting to the college, for this college provide bicycle parking facility on the campus. Besides this, institution observes "**No Vehicle Day**" on Thursday of the second week of every month for the staff and the students to save energy and minimize environmental pollution.

• Public Transport:

The college is well connected to neighboring villages by public transport. The maximum number of students belong to the rural parts, hence they use public transportation such as S.T. (State Transport) buses as well as trains. For this purpose, Maharashtra State Road Transportation Corporation (MSRTC) provides concession to the students to commute to the college from their desired destinations.

• Pedestrian Friendly Roads:

Students and few staff members also attend the college by pedestrian-friendly roads.

• Plastic Free Campus:

The college sensitizes the staff and students to deal with the threat of plastic, a major contributor to worldwide pollution. Since we believe in eco-friendly campus; everyone is discouraged from using plastic bags and adopted the 3 R's Reduce/Reuse/Recycle. Signboards/Posters are displayed on the college campus for encouraging ideas of a plastic free environment.

• Paperless Office:

- The college has takes initiative in making the official, administrative, academic, examination and student support activities paperless. The mutual communication between office and S.P. Pune University, Pune, UGC, Head of the departments, staff and various college committee members, circulars, notices, and important information is mostly carried out through electronic media.
- The college has installed an electronic notice board and TV monitors to display various important notices, circulars, day-to-day college activities and information for the students.
- Electronic gadgets are favored to transfer and store the official data and information. The college has developed the bulk message system for students, WhatsApp group and online leave facility for teaching and non-teaching staffs. The college is equipped with various software for admission, finance, library, and examination, which minimize the use of papers.

• Green Landscaping with Trees and Plants:

Green landscaping on the campus has taken place through several green initiative programmes by the Department of Botany and Geography. Green practices are conducted every year through NSS and NCC units of the college. Flora and Fauna of the campus are enriched with Trees, Shrubs, Herbs, Climbers and different types of bird's species. The college has a rich Botanical Garden with medicinal, ornamental and fruit plants collection. The college maintains and ensures complete transparency in its financial, academic and auxiliary functions; a participatory mechanism is set up in the college and our parent institutional level. The participative functioning of the college ensures the involvement of all the stakeholders. All the stakeholders are involved in framing policies and participation in the decision making. The equal representation is given to teachers, non-teaching staff, students, alumni, management representatives, and external experts.

The Alumni Association and Parent Teacher Association (PTA) help to bridge the communication gap between alumni, parents, and college respectively and facilitate their participation in various important events/functions.

Financial:

The budget for every financial year is planned as per the requirements submitted by HODs of the concerned departments through Local Management Committee (LMC)/ College Development Committee (CDC) by mutual consent within the financial policy framework. - To encourage faculty members to participate and present their research papers in National and International Conferences/Seminars/Workshops/Symposiums.
- To organize seminars/conferences/workshops on the research theme.
- To publish quality research articles in UGC listed journals, journals with good repute/impact factor.

- To publish quality academic and research books.
- To provide seed money and incentives to the teachers and student scholars for research activities.

3. The Context:

For the development of any country, science and technology play a pivotal role. India is being a developing country, promotion of research is very crucial. In any higher educational institute, knowledge creation is as important as knowledge transfer. This could be achieved, only by enabling the researchers by focusing on their core research work with a support system and helping them to gain the necessary funding, to obtain the required facilities and dedicate adequate time for their research activities. The repute of any educational institution on Teaching-Learning-Research and Innovations.

Therefore promotion of research is a need of the time. The college initiates research activities through the motivation, incentivization and providing basic research facilities to the faculty and the students.

4. The Practice:

- Faculty members are encouraged to participate and present their research papers in National and International Conferences/Seminars/Workshops/Symposiums for which the college provides TA/DA and duty leave.
- Faculty members are motivated to apply for research grants to different funding agencies.
- The college provides seed money and incentives to the faculty for research activities.
- The college has established Instrumentation Facility Center (IFC) under DST-FIST scheme.
- The college provides computing and internet facility, e-journals, INFLIBNET, DELNET etc. for research scholars and teachers.
- Students are encouraged to participate in AVISHKAR and Science Talent Search Examination for developing their research attitude.
- The college organizes Seminars/Conferences/Workshops on various research themes.
- The college provides a Study Leave Facility for the teachers pursuing their Ph. D/M. Phil. degree.
- The college provides free access to anti-plagiarism software **Turnitin** for research scholars and teachers and has also prepared a code of ethics in research.
- The college has established linkages and MoUs with Institutes/Industries for research and training etc.

5. Evidence of Success:

After the implementation of the promotion of research as the best practice. The college has observed successful outcomes in research in the last few years. The achievement in the field of research is the main indicator of excellence in research accomplished at the college.

• Presently in the college 29 faculty members have been awarded a Ph.D. degree. The college has research centers for Ph.D. and M. Phil. for the subjects Marathi and Economics. 12 faculty members are recognized research guides/supervisors in various subjects and 21 students have completed/submitted Ph.D. thesis and 117 research scholars have completed their M. Phil. under their guidance. The college teachers have published 136 research papers in the journals notified by UGC, 59 research articles in other journals, 213 research papers in

conferences/workshops/symposiums, 58 books/chapters in various publications and 01 Major and 62 Minor research projects completed/ongoing during the last five years.

- The college provides Rs. 5000/- as an incentive for the teachers for their extraordinary work in research.
- The college provides financial support to teachers for attending and presenting their research work in conferences/seminars/workshops in and abroad.
- The college has established well-equipped Instrumentation Facility Centre (IFC) under the DST-FIST scheme.
- The college has organized 30 Seminars/Conferences/ Workshops in the last five years.
- Financial supports are provided to the faculty for attending Seminars/Conferences/Workshops etc.
- The college has successfully organized **Rayat Vidnyan Parishad** in collaboration with Tata Institutes of Fundamental Research, Mumbai (TIFR) in 2014 to promote the research culture in the school children, the college students, and the teachers.
- The college has established 93 linkages and 41 MoUs for research, student on-the-job training.
- The students participated in the Avishkar Research Competition and Science Talent Search Examination.
- The college has established a Soil and Water Testing Laboratory, recognized by Govt. of Maharashtra and generated Rs. 6,91,068/- consultancy through testing soil samples under the Soil Health Card scheme by the Department of Agriculture and Farmer Welfare, Govt. of India.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Laboratory facilities need to be strengthened.
- Challenges of plagiarism in research.
- Fewer funds for research projects from UGC, BCUD, S. P. Pune University, Pune etc.
- Less budgetary provision for research activities from the college funds.

II. Title of the Practice: Green Campus Initiatives

1. Objectives of the Practice:

We have identified the following objectives which are in tune with the practice

- 1. To promote awareness of environmental issues among the students, staff, and society.
- 2. To achieve better sustainability on the campus and improve the quality of life of all the stakeholders.
- 3. To conserve water resources through rainwater harvesting.
- 4. To plant rare and medicinal/herbal plants on the college campus
- 5. To implement 3 'R' (Reduce/Reuse/Recycle) policy on the campus.
- 6. To use renewable energy resources (solar energy).
- 7. To study and maintain Flora and Fauna on the college campus.
- 8. To support and implement "Swachh Bharat Abhiyan" for healthy India
- 9. To organize seminars/workshops, expert lectures etc. on environment-related issues.

2. The Context:

A clean environment is a basic necessity of human beings for health and efficiency. The main aim of the practice is to impart knowledge, create awareness and develop an attitude of concern and to nurture necessary skills to handle the environmental issues and challenges. The semi-urban region and green landscaping of R. B. Narayanrao Borawake College are the necessary features for shaping and sustaining an eco-friendly campus. The college is spread over 42.37 acres of lush green area. The campus is an abode of wildlife species such as Malabar Grey Horn Bills, Chameleons, Parrots, Squirrels, Owls, Shikra, Sunbirds, Pigeons, Sparrows, Kingfisher, different types of butterfly, insects etc. This has provided the context for initiating and imparting the practice for an eco-friendly campus.

3. The Practice:

- The college conducts periodically a green audit by external peers. The objective of the green audit is to promote the Environment Management and Conservation on the college campus and introduce and aware students to the real concerns of environment and its sustainability. We have undertaken a program of labeling the plants on the college campus. The college has developed beautiful campus with Lawns, Ornamental garden, Botanical garden, Cactus garden as well as Tamarind, Amla and Teak projects.
- Department of Zoology has developed Vermicomposting units on the campus. The objective is to create awareness of the solid waste management and recycle solid waste from the college campus and produce economically important Vermicompost.
- Borewell recharge pits are constructed on the college campus for harvesting the rainwater.
- In the last five years, the college is using renewable energy like solar energy for water heaters in girls and boys hostels. Solar street lights along the roadside on campus are also installed and used efficiently. Recently college has installed Solar Power Generation Plant of **53 kWh**.
- The college has preserved **Flora and Fauna** on the campus.
- The college has installed **the Effluent Treatment Plant** (ETP) for the treatment of effluent generated from Chemistry laboratories.
- In the last five years Rs. 91.86 Lakhs have been incurred on green initiatives and waste management on the campus.
- For proper disposable of raw glass materials and raw papers (Raddi) institution has made the MoUs with Amol Scientific Glass Works, Babhaleshwar Tal. Rahata and Karimbhai Raddiwala Depot, Shrirampur respectively for proper recycling and reuse.
- Signboards/posters are displayed on the college campus for encouraging ideas of plastic-free campus, noise pollution, and environmental awareness.
- The college organizes seminars/workshops, expert lectures etc. on environment-related issues
- LED bulbs are installed in the college buildings to save electricity.
- College observes 'No Vehicle Day'.
- The energy audit of consumption of electricity in the college is conducted periodically by Aditi Engineering Services, Nashik. The objective of the audit is to identify energy consumption and conservation opportunity.
- Fire safety audit for fire prevention and electrical safety on the college campus is conducted during the academic year 2017-2018 by Fire Cools, MIDC, Shrirampur. The objective of the audit is to identify all significant fire hazards and evaluate the existing control measures.
- The college has conducted Carbon Sequestration Audit in the year 2017-18. The objective of the audit is to measure carbon emission and determination of the carbon footprint analysis.

4. Evidence of the Success:

This best practice has proven to be successful through the following activities:

- Through periodical tree plantations, Flora and Fauna on the campus has enriched, which has turned into eco-friendly campus.
- Out of total required, electrical power consumption about 70.38% is met through the use of Solar Energy.
- Awareness campaign for the plastic-free campus through signboards/display boards made campus plastic free.
- Through the Effluent Treatment Plant (ETP) effluents from Chemistry laboratory is recycled and treated water is utilized for different purposes. This has led to water conservation and minimization of environmental pollution on the campus.
- Vermicomposting units helped us to convert solid waste into organic fertilizers which have minimized the solid waste on the campus.
- The college has introduced UGC funded Career Oriented Courses such as Vermicomposting and Rain Water Harvesting in last five years.
- No Vehicle Day helps us to minimize the air pollution on the campus.
- Through workshops/ seminars/expert lectures/ NSS/NCC activities, students are made aware of environmental issues.
- Green audit and Energy audit of the campus is done periodically and regularly.
- A mandatory course on Environmental awareness at S.Y.B.A/B.Sc level and Green Chemistry Practicals for M.Sc, Part-II (Organic Chemistry) are offered by the university.
- The Langstroth Hive Boxes are placed in the botanical garden for the conservation of honey bees and effective pollination of flowering plants

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

While carrying out this practice, following problem are encountered by the college.

- Green Campus initiatives are challenging so it requires determination and a long term assurance from all the stakeholders.
- Green Campus initiative is rather expensive practice. It needs an expert advice and investment of resources.
- Less awareness of students and community towards environmental issues.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

Excellent student support facilities with good infrastructure moving towards the quest for excellence:

- To keep pace with the competitive world and to challenge the global, scenario every institution has to strive hard to achieve its excellence in different fields. Keeping this view on its board the college is taking high strides towards excellence in various fields over the years. From the date of establishment, to till the date, the college has successfully achieved its excellence in infrastructure and student support facilities. This conspicuously shows that our college has reached certain distinctiveness from other higher educational institutions.
- Vision and mission of the college are to provide a better education for youth advancing towards the world leader nation-India and to produce the dignity of labour and make arrangements of providing the education against the labour. In view of this, our college is offering 14 undergraduate, 15 postgraduate, 02 M. Phil., 02 Ph. D. programmes and 34 short term/value added/skill based courses. The PG centers of the college constitute a vital part of the academic structure.
- The college campus is spread over in 42.37 acres. As per the requirements, college creates necessary infrastructure systematically and continuously with the needs of future vision. The college provides excellent physical infrastructure facilities such as adequate number of classrooms, staff rooms, restrooms, seminar halls, conference hall, library building, reading room, TBSS building, YCMOU section, administrative building, the Principal's quarter, staff quarters for the teaching and the non-teaching staff, ladies hostels, boys hostel, Indoor stadium etc.
- To cater excellent academic needs for the budding scholars and researchers, the college gives priority in providing better infrastructural facilities. The college has various laboratories for different subjects like 05 Physics, 10 Chemistry, 02 Botany, 02 Zoology, 01 Mathematics, 02 Geography, 01 Psychology, and 04 Computer Science laboratories. Department of English has an updated Digital Interactive Language Laboratory.
- The college has established well-equipped Instrumentation Facility Centre (IFC) with 46 functional instruments for teaching and research under DST-FIST grants.
- The college has ICT enabled classrooms, computers, and printers to facilitate the teaching-learning process.
- The college also has established **Soil and Water Testing Laboratory** in the year 2017 which is approved by Government of Maharashtra, through this laboratory 2598 soil samples are analyzed under **"Soil Health Card"** scheme of Ministry of Agriculture and Farmer's Welfare, Government of India.
- The central library of the college is fully automated which uses integrated library Management System Known as Libreria Software. The Library Management Software consists of Modules such as Book Management, Book Accession, Membership, Books circulation, OPAC and Catalogues. The Server and cloud computing facility is maintained by MKCL. The Barcode facility for books and Membership is also provided. E-journals, Shodhganga membership, e-books, Database, 50 Mbps bandwidth and BSNL leased line Optic Fiber internet connection with campus Wi-Fi are available for the students and the staff.
- For the all-round development of the students, the college provides fully equipped Gymnasium (Fitness Zone) housing modern equipments. An indoor sports facility with the furnished wooden court is made available to the students and the staff. The students are trained and motivated to take part in various sports events at national and international level. Incentives like traveling allowance, dearness allowance, sports kits and tracksuits to the winners are provided to boost the confidence of the students. The college also gives concession in tuition fees and hostel fees to the sports players.
- For better employability and economical support to the students, the college has signed MoUs with Tata Business Support Service (TBSS) Limited, Hyderabad. Tata Business Support Services (TBSS) Limited has established BPO center on the college campus in December 2011. Tata

Business Support Services (TBSS) Limited is working with a large number of students from the college. In the last five years, 267 students from the campus and off-campus are placed on various positions through TBSS center.

- In the selection and placement process, the first priority is given to the college candidates who are economically poor and unable to complete their education because of financial reasons. The college and TATA Business Group encourage the students to become self-dependent to complete their education and promote the concept of **Earn While Learn**. Along with this, the college conducts campus interviews in collaboration with Kotak Mahindra Bank, ICICI Bank, Harman Fino-Chem Ltd. Aurangabad, Sci-Edge Abstract Ltd., Pune, Navin Fluorine Ltd., Surat, Jubilant ChemSys Ltd., Noida, Macleods Pharmaceutical Ltd., Mumbai etc. The college runs various value-added and short term courses to make the students competent enough to grab the job opportunities.
- NSS and NCC units provide the best platform to the students to inculcate the values of national unity and integration through which they enhance their vision of social inclusion.
- Earn and Learn Scheme is functional in the college. In the last five years, the college has spent Rs. 26,17,140/- and it has given opportunities to the economically backward students to Earn While Learn hence become self-dependent.
- The major bulk of the students including girl students come from neighboring villages, hence college has well structured 03 girl's hostels and a boy's hostel with required amenities.
- The college provides assistance in getting Government fellowships and scholarships to the needy students who belong to different social backgrounds. In the last five years, the college has helped 7896 number of students in getting scholarships. Besides, the Govt. Scholarships college takes initiatives in helping economically backward students by providing them a concession in the college fees. In the last five years, the college has provided Rs. 26,67,842/- for needy students under the **Student Aid Fund**.
- The college gives special guidance on NET/SET examinations to the students and also organizes various workshops/lectures for their benefit.
